Intentional Teachings



This year we've implemented a stronger focus on our intentional teachings. These are new topics each term that we intend to educate the children about through new and fun activities. Last semester, the topics were culture and music. The image above is an example of how we taught the children about Indigenous culture. During NAIDOC Week, we discussed what an Acknowledgement of Country means and its importance, and the kids wrote their own Acknowledgements based on what they learnt.

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We've also been introducing new cultures through our lunches and afternoon tea. During the recent vacation care, the kids had lunch choices like teriyaki chicken with vegetables, lentil and sweet potato enchiladas, and sweet potato, chickpea and spinach curry. These options introduce the children to cultures by allowing them to experience different cuisines.
